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
Accountability with a Kicker: Observations on the Florida A+ Accountability Plan

The A+ Accountability Plan in Florida predated NCLB but has similar provisions. Thus, the authors realized, a study of how the system has played out in Florida might allow us to see where NCLB is leading us.

N 1999, FLORIDA implemented a major reform of its accountability system, called the A+ Accountability Plan. A unique aspect of the A+ Plan is its explicit attempt to invoke market forces by allowing students in low-performing schools that meet specified criteria to receive vouchers that can be redeemed at an eligible public or private school. It is this "opportunity scholarship" (the portion of the A+ Plan that allows for vouchers) that set the accountability system in Florida apart from that of any other state at that time.

Since then, the Supreme Court's Zelman decision ruled that using vouchers for religious private schools is permissible. In addition, the No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Act requires that all schools failing to achieve adequate yearly progress (AYP) implement a program similar to the opportunity scholarships in that it would
