**N. Scott Arnold** is Assistant Professor of Philosophy at the University of Alabama at Birmingham. He has published articles on ethics and economics in the *Canadian Journal of Philosophy* and *Ethics*. Currently, he is writing a book on Marx's radical critique of capitalism.
