Oral historians have begun to use interviews in significant ways to supplement what may be described as the more traditional institutional "bricks and mortar" histories of colleges and universities. Many large public universities in the Americas were founded after 1850 and first published their histories at the half-century mark following the beginning of the twentieth century. In many instances, these college histories focused on firsts and founders and gave particular attention to the physical development of the campus and especially the construction of buildings. These two books, one from the University of Florida in Gainesville, and the other from the University of Alberta in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada, present an interesting contrast in the use of oral history in tracing the histories of these two universities from 1906 to 2006.

In the case of Gator Tales, historian Pleasants has written a book that will have
